GREENWOOD MINI HISTORY

Greenwood Wildlife Rehabilitation

Center is a nonprofit corporation that is
devoted to the rehabilitation and release
of orphaned, sick, and injured wildlife.

We have been in existence since 1982.

We are named after "Greenwood," the first raccoon rehabilitated and released by our organization. Since then, we have successfully treated and released thousands of animals.

In October, 1993, Greenwood obtained 501(c)(3) status from the IRS as a nonprofit charitable organization.

Greenwood now maintains the largest wildlife rehabilitation facility along Colorado's Front Range. The vast majority of our funding comes from the generosity of concerned citizens, businesses, and foundations.



PACIFIC LOON CRASH LANDS INLAND

A loon might sound like a character from a television show. But in reality, it is a water bird that is not so common in Colorado. Only one species in this family is known to regularly migrate through our state, the Common Loon. Imagine our surprise when Greenwood received a juvenile Pacific Loon in need. Sightings in Colorado have been few and far between, but their populations are strong along the coasts. In our 40-year history, Greenwood has never treated this species!

The animal arrived in poor condition, underweight with injuries to its wing and abrasions on its feet. Luckily for the loon, a caring woman was walking by and noticed it in distress. She flagged down a construction crew, and together they corralled the bird for transport to our Center.

Water birds of this type will often crash land on asphalt, mistaking the stretch of road for a body of water. Our rehabilitators assumed this is what caused the scrapes. Since these creatures have evolved for diving rather than walking, they are unable to take off from land, leaving this poor critter stranded on the road. We are so glad a caring resident was able to get it help!

Once at the Center, our waterfowl specialists jumped into action. They provided medications to make it more comfortable and devised a plan for its care. Very soon, the loon was on the mend. Nutrient-packed fish, pain medications, anti-parasite treatments, and swim therapy were just a few methods utilized to aid in its recovery. The bird began gaining weight and became much livelier in its enclosure. After just the third day of care, it attempted to jump out of its indoor pool! The Animal Care Team moved it into an outdoor enclosure with a big swimming hole and beach. The loon thrived in the open-air space, diving and gorging on fish all the live-long day.

With the loon's condition improving, specialists began to look for the best possible release site. Greenwood was given access to a private pond filled with fish and free

from human activities. The loon passed its "flap test," meaning it was ready for flight and prepared for its return to the wild. On release day, it hopped from its transport bin and swam calmly out into the open water. It immediately dunked its head and slurped down a fish. What a great sign to the spectating rehabilitators, who were overjoyed with the success! The Greenwood team couldn't have been happier in helping this special species return to the wild.

ANIMAL TAILS 1 — Rock Squirrel Rocks Recovery

A young Rock Squirrel was found on his back under a tree in Loveland, struggling in the summer heat. After an unsuccessful reunite, the rescuer fed him puppy milk and then brought him to Greenwood, in hopes of saving this tiny mammal's life. Unfortunately, despite good intentions, the milk caused fluid to build up in the tiny rodent's lungs. Luckily, our staff was able to clear that up with antibiotics, and he now shows no signs of pneumonia. The critter is devouring our specialty formula several times a day and being introduced to some blackberries, grass, and the occasional sweet potato. With his hearty appetite and long snoozes, we have lots of hope that this Rock Squirrel will recover and return to the wild.



ANIMAL TAILS 2 — Magpie Trio Takes to the Skies

Three sassy Black-billed Magpies were released back into their natural habitat this summer. These sporty-looking birds came to Greenwood orphaned after their nest was destroyed and their mother did not return. They were in relatively good shape when they arrived, other than mild dehydration. Our medical staff were thrilled with their good health since the magpies' finder had fed them chicken for several days. Often the instinct for rescuers to feed baby critters has ended fatally for our patients. We provided the feathered tykes with much needed hydration and a warm napping nest. When they moved to our outside caging to mature and learn to forage, these three cheeky chirpers were side by side, swinging from branches and taunting the animal care staff. On release day, the trio jetted to the skies, ready for a new adventure.
